comprehensive manthan (deliberation) on the cooperative sector was held to explore the progress made across the country, evaluate the achievements of various initiatives, and discuss the implementation of central schemes-from the grassroots level units like Primary Agricultural Credit Societies (PACS) to apex cooperative institutions.

This in-depth dialogue with states aimed to discover the amrit (elixir) of cooperation by identifying solutions and charting new directions for the cooperative movement. The review focused on the development of the cooperative sector and addressing existing challenges. Chaired by Union Minister for Home and Cooperation Shri Amit Shah, the Ministry of Cooperation held extensive deliberations with cooperation ministers from all states and Union Territories to assess the progress of ministry-led initiatives. This effort marks a significant step towards strengthening the cooperative sector and redefining its future course. It not only accelerates plans to fortify the cooperative movement in India but also enhances Centre-State collaboration to evaluate and scale up grassroots achievements. Emphasis was laid on harnessing the immense potential of the cooperative sector to actively contribute to the making of a developed India.

The Ministry of Cooperation has developed a National Cooperative Database, which presents comprehensive data on cooperative institutions at the national, state, district, and tehsil levels. This initiative has made it significantly easier to identify regions where the cooperative framework is either weak or non-existent. Moving forward, the Ministry is actively advancing a plan to expand cooperative societies to every village in the country within the next five years. As part of this mission, two lakh new multipurpose cooperative societies are being established to strengthen grassroots-level cooperation and ensure inclusive rural development.

Cooperation has always been the foundation of Indian rural life. Since ancient times, a strong spirit of mutual cooperation has prevailed among the people of India, enabling collective efforts toward progress and economic upliftment. Recognizing this development-oriented philosophy as a key pillar of a Developed India, the Government of India established the Ministry of Cooperation four years ago. With the vision of "Prosperity through Cooperation", this historic decision has infused new direction, energy, and momentum into the cooperative movement. Under the leadership of Union Home and Cooperation Minister Shri Amit Shah, the Ministry has launched more than 60 impactful, strategic, and far-reaching initiatives for the development of the cooperative sector. These efforts have not only transformed the landscape of Indian cooperatives but have also earned global recognition for India's cooperative progress. A shining example of this recognition is the launch of the International Year of Cooperatives 2025 celebrations from India—a testimony to the country's leadership and achievements in the cooperative domain. •••



On July 5, Union Minister for Home and Cooperation Shri Amit Shah performed the Bhoomi Poojan of the

'Tribhuvan Sahkari University,' which will be built over 125 acres within the Institute of Rural Management, Anand campus in Gujarat, at a cost

of ₹500 crore. With this, the date has been etched in the pages of history. Ministers of State for Cooperation Shri Krishan Pal Gurjar and Shri Murlidhar Mohol, along with several prominent cooperative leaders from across the country, witnessed this historic moment.

The university has been named after Tribhuvandas Kishibhai Patel, one of the founding figures of India's cooperative movement. Addressing the gathering on this occasion, Union Home and Cooperation Minister Shri Amit Shah said, "Today is a very significant day for the cooperative sector. Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi has paid a true tribute to Tribhuvandas Patel. The foundation of this Cooperative University is laid with the aim of promoting transparency, accountability, research, and the spirit of cooperative federalism. And no one could be more deserving than Tribhuvandas Patel to lend his name to this institution." On his X handle, Shri Shah wrote, "From the land of Anand, revered Tribhuvandas Patel Ji ignited the spirit of transformation in the lives of the poor, women, and farmers through cooperatives. The university being established in his name is a path-breaking initiative to connect the youth power with the power of cooperation. commencement of its construction, reflect the strong commitment of the Central Government towards strengthening cooperative education and training. The idea behind this university was conceptualized by Union Home and Cooperation Minister Shri Amit Shah himself. It is also a matter of personal responsibility for him to ensure that the university is completed at the earliest and academic activities commence without delay.

To instil hope in the lives of crores of marginalised and rural citizens

and to empower them economically, Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi established the Ministry of Cooperation four years ago. Cooperative Education Module Launched for Schools

In a historic step aimed at raising awareness about India's cooperative movement among school students, the Ministry of Cooperation, in collaboration with the Ministry of Education, the National Council for Cooperative Training (NCCT), and the National Council of Educational Research and Training (NCERT), has introduced a special bilingual educational module on cooperation. Union Home and Cooperation Minister Shri Amit Shah formally unveiled the module during the foundation stone ceremony of the Tribhuvan Sahkari University. Prepared in both Hindi and English, the module has been designed to be interactive, accessible, and student-friendly. It reflects the Ministry's commitment to integrating cooperative education into school curricula and familiarizing youth with the core values of cooperation. The module introduces students to various aspects of India's cooperative movement—from the concept of cooperative societies in ancient India, their constitutional status, principles and values, to their roles before and after independence. It also highlights prominent cooperative leaders, different forms of cooperative societies, and the Ministry's recent initiatives. The Ministry has

also announced plans to include cooperative education in the curriculum for students from Class 6 onwards and to introduce "Cooperation" as an elective subject for Classes 11 and 12. This initiative will help students connect more deeply with institutions like the Tribhuvan Cooperative University. This step ensures that the message— "Cooperation is not just an idea, but a movement"-reaches every young learner across the country.

women and youth in cooperatives. The establishment of the Tribhuvan Sahkari University is a key part of this broader vision.

Addressing Gaps in the **Cooperative Sector**

While laying the foundation stone of the university, Shri Amit Shah remarked that the establishment of the Tribhuvan Cooperative University is a significant initiative aimed at addressing the longstanding gaps in the cooperative sector. Under the leadership of Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi, the cooperative movement is progressing rapidly across the country. The foundation university marks transformative step in strengthening the sector. Today, over 40 lakh employees are associated with the cooperative movement, there are 80 lakh board members, and nearly crore people—approximately one in every four Indians—are connected to it. This university will play a vital role in filling the critical voids in education, training, and innovation within this vast ecosystem. The university will not only design policies but also promote innovation, lay the groundwork for research, and develop a standardized training curriculum for cooperative institutions across India. It will work to unify and elevate the cooperative movement on a national scale. By offering a platform for emerging talent, the university will become the cradle of cooperative policymaking and act as a guiding force for the entire sector.

Meeting the Demand for **Skilled Human Resources**

According to the Union Minister Cooperation, there previously no systematic framework for training employees and members of cooperative societies to support the growth of the cooperative sector. Earlier, employees would receive training only after being

recruited into cooperatives. However, with the establishment of this university, only those who have undergone formal training will be eligible for employment in the cooperative sector. This move will eliminate nepotism and bring greater transparency. Only trained youth from the Cooperative University will be considered eligible for roles in cooperative institutions. The university will play a vital role in fulfilling the growing demand for skilled human resources in India's cooperative landscape. At this university, students will not only acquire technical expertise, accountancy skills, scientific approaches, and marketing knowledge but will also be instilled with the core values of cooperation—recognizing that the cooperative movement is dedicated to the upliftment of the country's marginalized communities, including Dalits, women, and tribal populations. Many of the persistent challenges facing the cooperative sector are expected to be addressed through this institution.

Shri Amit Shah highlighted that the Prime Minister has decided to establish two lakh new Primary Agricultural Credit Societies (PACS), of which 60,000 will be set up by the end of this year. These PACS alone will require around 17 lakh employees. Additionally, district-level dairy cooperatives are being established, all of which will

Cooperation: An Integral Part of Indian Culture

The core values of Indian culture—"Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam" (The world is one family) and "Sarve Bhavantu Sukhinah" (May all be happy) form the very foundation of the spirit of cooperation. With over 30 crore members, India's vast cooperative movement has long lacked a dedicated framework for education, training, and innovation. The Tribhuvan Sahkari University will address this vacuum. It will drive the development of cooperative policies, foster innovation, lay the foundation for research, provide training, and design a standardized curriculum for cooperative institutions across the country. Additionally, through the implementation of government schemes via two lakh new and 85,000 existing Primary Agricultural Credit Societies (PACS), the university will play a central role in translating cooperative policies into action on the ground, ensuring their reach and impact at the grassroots level.

need skilled manpower—something the Tribhuvan Cooperative University designed to provide. This university will also be instrumental in policy formulation, data analysis, and drafting 5-year, 10-year, and 25year strategic development plans for India's cooperative sector. Research activities will be an integral part of the university's mission. It will not only produce trained cooperative personnel but also groom dedicated cooperative leaders in the spirit of Tribhuvandas Patel, who will go on to lead the cooperative movement in the future.

Shri Shah further noted that through the two lakh new and 85,000 existing PACS, the implementation of all cooperative-linked schemes

will be facilitated on the ground. The Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE) has already "Cooperation" introduced as a subject in classes 9 to 12. He urged the Gujarat government to include the subject of cooperation in its curriculum as well so that the general public can become more aware of the cooperative movement.

Cooperative Experts Urged to Join the University

establishment of university will not only strengthen and expand India's cooperative movement but also position the country as a global hub of cooperatives. The policies and curricula developed by the Tribhuvan Cooperative University will help

transform the cooperative economic model into a people's movement. The university will serve as a key institution for supplying qualified personnel to major cooperative organizations across the nation. Shri Amit Shah emphasized that if India aims to launch cooperative initiatives such as a cooperative taxi service or a cooperative insurance company, then it will require experts, trained professionals, and visionary cooperative leaders across various domains. Appealing to the entire cooperative sector of the country, he called upon cooperative training experts from across India to associate themselves with this university and contribute their knowledge and experience to help shape the future of cooperation in the nation.

University to Connect All Cooperative Institutions

the Tribhuvan Sahkari University, special focus will be placed on key sectors such as dairy, fisheries, sugar, banking, rural credit, cooperative finance, cooperative marketing, and multistate cooperatives. In states with a large number of cooperative institutions, four to five colleges will be affiliated with the university, while in other states, one or two cooperative colleges will be linked. Provisions have also been made to affiliate the university with international-level cooperative universities and institutions. It will serve as a vital link among cooperative management institutes across the country. Efforts are underway to integrate cooperative education into the national school curriculum. In the first phase, NCERT textbooks will include topics on cooperation. The university will design and implement detailed diploma and degree programs training and management for various types of cooperative institutions.



Tribhuvandas Patel: A Role Model in Cooperation

Tribhuvandas Patel sowed the seeds of a revolutionary idea on the land of Anand under the guidance of Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel. He began with a small group for milk collection and launched a major campaign to empower farmers through cooperation. In 1946, the Kheda District Cooperative Milk Producers' Union was established—an initiative that grew into what the world now knows as Amul, a towering banyan tree born from Tribhuvandas Patel's vision. Today, Amul is connected with over 36 lakh women and has an annual turnover of ₹80,000 crore. It has emerged as one of the most valuable food brands globally. Thanks to Tribhuvandas Patel's visionary leadership, India's cooperative dairy sector proudly stands shoulder-to-shoulder with private dairy giants across the world. Shri Amit Shah remarked that Tribhuvandas Patel is a shining example of how a true cooperative leader—working selflessly for the welfare of every member can play a monumental role in nation-building and in creating a prosperous India.

Inspired by Vedic traditions, students will be introduced to sustainable agricultural practices, ethical business conduct, community-driven economic models. Another core objective of the university is to standardize cooperative education across the country. The university will function as a central institution, pooling resources from ICAR centers,

Krishi Vigyan Kendras (KVKs), CSIR institutions, health institutes, and other universities. Secretaries of Primary Agricultural Credit Societies (PACS) will also receive training here. Moving beyond the conventional Minimum Support Price (MSP) framework, the university will help cooperative societies adopt marketdriven solutions and self-sustaining business models. •••

Boundless Opportunities for Rural Development through Cooperatives

n the occasion of the International Year of Cooperatives 2025, Union Minister for Home and Cooperation Shri Amit Shah has been actively leading efforts to give a new direction and momentum to India's

cooperative movement. As the first half of this landmark year concludes, several major initiatives have already been launched under his leadership, with implementation now underway. These include the establishment of the Tribhuvan Sahkari University, the creation of three new multi-state cooperatives in the dairy sector, the launch of a cooperative taxi service, and the formation of a whollyowned cooperative insurance company. The meeting was a significant step toward strengthening the cooperative ecosystem. It aimed to review the ongoing schemes, evaluate the achievements, and foster greater collaboration among stakeholders to further empower the cooperative movement—particularly in unlocking the vast potential it holds for rural development and inclusive growth.

Manthan Meeting Charts the Future of India's Cooperative Sector

A comprehensive discussion on policies related to the cooperative sector, new initiatives, and the implementation of government schemes took place during the 'Manthan' meeting, organized to chart the future roadmap of India's cooperative movement. The meeting aimed to formulate a concrete strategy for cooperative development. Under the leadership of Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi and the visionary guidance of Union Home and Cooperation Minister Shri Amit Shah, the central government is empowering cooperative institutions across the country to further strengthen the cooperative movement. The Manthan meeting was an integral part of these ongoing efforts.

Union Minister for Home and Cooperation Shri Amit Shah said, "Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi established the Ministry of Cooperation not only to revive the ageold spirit of cooperation in the country but also to align it with a modern perspective. Around 60 to 70 crore people in the country once lacked access to even the most basic amenities of life. In the past ten years, the Modi government has fulfilled the dreams of these millions by providing housing, toilets, clean drinking water, food grains, healthcare, gas cylinders, and other essential facilities. These people now aspire to improve their quality of life through entrepreneurship, but they lack capital. The only viable way to turn the small capital of millions into largescale initiatives is through cooperation." He further added that in a country like India with a population of 140 crore, two things are critically important: the growth of GDP and GSDP, and the creation of employment for every citizen. For generating employment for all, there is no alternative to cooperation. It was with this foresight that the Ministry of Cooperation was established.

Every Village to be Linked with a Cooperative in the Next Five Years

There is immense potential in the cooperative sector for the welfare of millions of small farmers and rural communities in India. To revive and strengthen this sector, the government has undertaken extensive legal, administrative, and financial reforms. According to the Union Minister for Cooperation, more than 60 initiatives have been launched by the Ministry of Cooperation so far. One of the most significant among these is the creation of a National Cooperative Database, which is being used to identify and address the gaps in the cooperative network across the country.

The National Cooperative Database has been developed to enable cooperative institutions at the national, state, district, and block levels to assess where in the countryespecially at the village level-there are no existing cooperatives. The Modi Government has set an ambitious target: in the next five years, not a single village in India should be left without a cooperative society. Emphasizing this goal, Shri Amit Shah stressed the effective use of the National Cooperative Database to achieve this transformative vision.

Comprehensive Review of **Government Initiatives**

The meeting placed strong emphasis on the comprehensive evaluation of initiatives undertaken by the Ministry of Cooperation. The aim was to facilitate meaningful exchange of best practices, policy frameworks, recommendations, and implementation strategies among states and union territories. Aligned with Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi's vision of "Sahkar se Samriddhi", the discussions during the meeting highlighted the critical importance of mutual collaboration and coordination in achieving inclusive development. Key focus areas of the deliberation included the progress made in setting

up two lakh Multipurpose Primary Agricultural Credit Societies (Multi-Purpose PACS) across the country, and the promotion of dairy and fisheries cooperatives to enhance rural service delivery. The meeting also featured in-depth discussions on the implementation of the world's largest food grain storage scheme in the cooperative sector. Representatives participating in the meeting also expressed their commitment to the spirit of "Cooperation in Cooperatives" and shared their intended contributions toward the International Year of Cooperatives 2025.

Education and Training to Transform the Future of Cooperatives

The decline of the cooperative movement in India can largely be attributed to three key reasons. First, the failure to amend outdated cooperative laws with timean issue that has now been addressed. Second, the lack of diversification and modernization of cooperative activities. Third, recruitment in the cooperative sector was previously marred by nepotism and favoritism. To rectify these systemic flaws, the Tribhuwan Sahkari University has been established. Shri Amit Shah urged all states to affiliate at least one cooperative training institute with the University. This step aims to create a centralized and integrated training ecosystem for the cooperative sector in every state. Empowering youth through structured cooperative education and training will not only lead to the holistic growth and expansion of cooperative institutions, but will also open new employment avenues, encouraging youth to pursue viable careers in the sector. ***

PACS to be Integrated with **Cutting-Edge Technology**

Credit Societies (PACS), computerization is underway. The Ministry of Cooperation has now set a target to computerize 80,000 PACS across the country. Once digitized, PACS will be transformed into inclusive, dynamic, seamless, and efficiently functioning institutions. To achieve this transformation, emerging technologies will be integrated into their operations, enabling farmers and communities to access a wide range of services through PACS. Speaking at a workshop on 'Emerging Technologies in PACS', Secretary, Ministry of Cooperation, Dr. Ashish Kumar Bhutani emphasized the need to connect rural systems with modern tech solutions. "Our farmers and rural citizens require timely advice on weather conditions, natural disasters, rainfall forecasts, and pest attacks. Today, advanced technologies are available that can be harnessed to raise awareness and empower rural India," Dr. Bhutani stated.

So far, approximately ₹3,000 crore has been spent under the PACS computerization scheme. The current goal is to digitize 80,000 PACS and integrate all Government of India schemes with them-transforming PACS into vibrant economic and social institutions. Drawing a parallel with the computerization of the



Indian Railways ticketing system, Dr. Ashish Kumar Bhutani highlighted that digitization would bring greater transparency to the functioning of PACS. It would also enhance their viability and turn them into valuable assets for society at large. He added that PACS have the potential to serve as a "one-stop shop" for the Government of India at the grassroots level. "We only need to ensure that PACS adopt the latest technologies to remain sustainable and relevant," he stressed.

The number of beneficiaries availing short-term credit through PACS has now risen to 42%. This clearly reflects the growing relevance and positive impact of PACS in serving the needs of small and marginal farmers across rural India. Of the nearly 2,000 banking licenses issued in the country, about 1,900 belong to cooperative institutions, while only 100 are held by other banks. However, the smallest credit structures are located in rural areas and have struggled to adopt new technologies. As a result, cooperative banks operate with a

limited range of banking products, and their functioning faces certain constraints.

Since the formation of the Ministry of Cooperation, key banking-related concerns of the cooperative sector have been taken up with the Reserve Bank of India (RBI), the Ministry of Finance, and the Income Tax Department. Now is the time for the cooperative banking structure to adopt modern technology, enhance transparency in operations, resolve human resource challenges, and become more competitive. The Secretary added that earlier, PACS were limited to offering credit and providing agricultural inputs. But with emerging reforms, they are poised to become dynamic multipurpose institutions that serve a broader economic and social role in rural development.

Under the visionary leadership of Union Minister for Home and Cooperation Shri Amit Shah, the Ministry of Cooperation has taken decisive steps to strengthen PACS and enhance their role as viable, community-driven institutions. • • •

India Emerges as Global Force in Mitigating Disasters

ith global warming and rising pollution levels, the world is grappling with

a growing frequency of natural and man-made disasters. Amid this, India is moving towards becoming a global leader in comprehensive disaster management. The credit for India's rising stature in this domain goes to the policies and vision of the government under the leadership of Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi. level. He highlighted the roles played by the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA), the National Disaster Response Force (NDRF), and the Coalition for Disaster Resilient Infrastructure (CDRI) in this national effort.

Shri Shah stated that speed of response is crucial in disaster management, as saving lives in the shortest possible time is of utmost during any crisis. The government

has equipped disaster response forces with modern technology, making them more skilled, efficient, and effective in their operations. He emphasized that India has also succeeded in providing accurate disaster forecasts and ensuring that timely information reaches people, thereby enabling public participation in crisis response. He pointed out that global warming is the root cause of most disasters. He stressed the need to integrate environmental conservation into every aspect of disaster preparedness. Without environmental protection, achieving disaster prevention is impossible.

Forecasting and Early Warning Systems

Union Minister of Cooperation Shri Amit Shah highlighted that India has made significant progress in developing disaster forecasting and early warning systems, which has played a vital role in minimizing damage during disasters. emphasized that under the Modi Government, the goal of "Minimum Casualty" has been successfully transformed into "Zero Casualty," drawing global attention appreciation. Citing examples, Shri Shah recalled that in the 1999 super cyclone in Odisha, over 10,000 people lost their lives, whereas during Cyclone Fani in 2019, the death toll was reduced to just one, thanks to timely alerts and coordinated preparedness. Towards 'Zero Casualty': A Proactive and Inclusive **Disaster Management Vision**

Union Home Minister Shri Amit Shah emphasized that under the leadership of Prime Minister Narendra Modi, India has undergone a transformational shift in its disaster management approach—moving from a relief-centric model to a comprehensive and integrated framework. human casualty, but no loss of livestock either—a testament to the effectiveness of proactive planning and collective action.

Shri Shah asserted that when the government, its agencies, and the public work together, it is entirely possible to successfully manage any disaster. He recognized the critical roles played by the National Disaster Response Force (NDRF) and State Disaster Response Forces (SDRF) in these achievements. During the 11 years of the Modi Government, both NDRF and SDRF have been significantly strengthened, substantial increases in budget allocations. He pointed out that from ₹38,000 crore during 2004–2014, the SDRF budget was raised to ₹1.44 lakh crore between 2014-2024. Similarly, the NDRF budget, which stood at ₹28,000 crore in 2004-2014, was increased to ₹84,000 crore under Prime Minister Modi's leadership. Additionally, Shri Shah announced the establishment of a National Disaster Risk Management Fund for the first time in India, with a corpus of ₹68,000 crore. 



To further strengthen medical education and increase the number of doctors in the country, the Modi government has expanded MBBS seats from 51,000 to 1,18,000, and postgraduate medical seats (MD and MS) from 31,000 to 74,000.

The government has also ensured free vaccinations for children from birth up to 15 years of age under the Mission Indradhanush and taken significant steps to ensure maternal and child nutrition through the Poshan Abhiyaan, thereby laying the foundation for a healthy generation. he most significant achievement of the Chhattisgarh government over the past one and a half years has been its progress toward making the state free from Naxalism. The government has

revived and accelerated a previously stalled anti-Naxal campaign. achieved. He further added that Naxalites, who typically remain inactive during the monsoon season, will not find peace this year, as operations by security forces will continue uninterrupted, even during the rains.

Union Home and Cooperation Minister Shri Amit Shah urged all youth who have strayed onto the path of Naxalism to lay down their arms and take advantage of the state government's surrender policy. He emphasized that there is no better opportunity than this for them to become part of the country's development journey. He noted that they not only sharpened the effectiveness of antinaxal operations in the state but also consistently guided the campaign and motivated the security forces. Their comprehensive efforts, he said, have made a significant contribution to the fight against Naxalism. •••

disha is not just a state but a shining iewel of India's rich heritage. For centuries, it

has made significant contributions to the development of Indian civilization and culture. Today, the blend of development and heritage forms the foundation of India's progress, with eastern India, including Odisha, playing a crucial role. These views were expressed by Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi at an event in Bhubaneswar, Odisha, where he also inaugurated and laid the foundation stone for development projects worth over ₹18,600 crore.

Speaking about the growth of Odisha and the entire eastern region, Shri Modi stated, "The development of 21st century India will be led by eastern India. This is the era of Purvodaya." Highlighting the expansion of industrial zones from Paradip to Jharsuguda, he noted that Odisha's mineral and port-based economy is becoming stronger. The central government is investing thousands of crores in improving road, rail, and air connectivity in Odisha. Projects such as the establishment of a mega dual-feed cracker and downstream unit at Paradip, a crude oil storage facility at Chandikhol and an LNG terminal at Gopalpur will position Odisha as a major industrial hub. These initiatives are expected to foster a wide network of small and medium enterprises and generate hundreds of thousands of new jobs for the youth. Referring to the

investment of around ₹1.5 lakh crore in the petroleum and petrochemical sectors in recent years, the Prime Minister said Odisha is rapidly emerging as a 'petrochemical hub.'

On the completion of one year of the state government, Shri Modi said that the administration has demonstrated good governance, committed to public service and trust. Odisha has embraced mantra of development while preserving its heritage. He mentioned that he declined an invitation from US President Trump, following the G-7 summit in Canada, to visit the US in order to come to the land of Jagannath. Shri Modi added that in recent years, the country has witnessed the success of India's development model, which has made the lives of its people easier. With the new government, Odisha has also entered a new era of social and economic transformation.

India is Advancing on a **New Path of Development**

The Prime Minister stated that Eastern India, which a decade ago was troubled by instability, separatism, and violence, has now seen an end to militant activities and is progressing on a new path of development. He highlighted that several eastern states, including Assam, surpassed many other states in the country on various development indicators. The positive impact of the

development model implemented by the Central and State Governments is now clearly visible in Odisha, a state that has faced challenges for decades. Referring to the Central Government's Ayushman Bharat Jan Arogya Yojana and the State's Gopabandhu Jan Arogya Yojana, Shri Modi noted that these schemes have provided free treatment to nearly three crore people in Odisha.

Speaking about empowering the marginalized and disadvantaged, Shri Modi said that before 2014, over 125 tribal-dominated districts across the country were affected by Naxalite violence. In recent years, his government has succeeded in removing tribal communities from this cycle of violence and set them on a path of development, sparking a new wave of progress in tribal areas. The Prime Minister expressed confidence that the tribal community will soon be free from the shadow of violence and that Naxalism will be eradicated from the country.

Holistic Development of Tribal Areas

Describing the government's commitment to fulfilling the aspirations of tribal communities, providing them with new opportunities, and easing their hardships, Shri Modi stated that for the first time, two major national schemes for tribal development have been launched with an investment of over one lakh crore rupees. The first of these schemes, the Dharti Aba Janjati Gram Utkarsh Yojana, is focused on development work





in more than 60,000 tribal villages across the country. In Odisha as well, houses are being constructed for tribal families, along with the provision of roads, electricity, and water facilities. Additionally, 40 residential schools are being established across 11 districts of the state. Shri Modi also noted that the inspiration for the PM Janman Yojana came from Odisha, and this scheme specifically targets the upliftment of particularly vulnerable tribal groups

within the tribal community.

Highlighting the welfare of the Prime Odisha's fishermen, Minister mentioned the Matsya Sampada Yojana, which has been designed for their benefit. Fishermen are now also able to access the Kisan Credit Card scheme. Furthermore, the Central Government is creating a special fund of ₹25,000 crore to support people living in Odisha's coastal areas and to provide new opportunities for the youth. •••



Shri Amit Shah Addresses the 25th Meeting of Central Zonal Council

Eradicating Child Malnutrition & Reducing School Dropout Rate

he states under the Central Zonal Council hold a crucial role in realizing Prime

Minister Shri Narendra Modi's vision of a developed India by 2047. While Zonal Councils primarily have an advisory role, under PM Shri Modi's leadership, these councils have moved beyond mere advisories, becoming powerful platforms for fostering mutual understanding and cooperation among states on various issues. Union Home Minister and Minister of Cooperation Shri Amit Shah emphasized these points while addressing the 25th meeting of the Central Zonal Council in Varanasi, Uttar Pradesh. Chairing the session, he highlighted that the Central Zonal Council is the only such body in which there are no disputes between member states, calling it a significant achievement.

In a show of unity, Shri Shah, along with all Chief Ministers and members present, moved a proposal to commend Prime Minister Shri Modi's strong resolve and the valour of the Indian Armed Forces, which was unanimously passed by the Council through a voice vote.

Shri Shah also praised the transformation of Varanasi since PM Shri Modi became an MP from the world's most ancient city. "Through the remarkable development of Kashi, the Prime Minister has shown all of us how a dedicated public

representative can bring about significant change for his people and constituency," he said.

Highlighting the improvement in the functioning of the Zonal Councils, Shri Shah pointed out that between 2004 and 2014, only 11 meetings of the Zonal Council and 14 meetings of its Standing Committees were held. In comparison, during the Modi government's tenure from 2014 to 2025, 28 Zonal Council meetings and 33 Standing Committee meetings were organized.

A total of 1,287 issues have been resolved in these meetings so far, a figure Shri Shah described as "historic and encouraging." Overall, 62 meetings of various Zonal Councils and their Standing Committees have been conducted in the last 11 years with active cooperation from state

governments, central ministries, and departments.

A total of 19 issues were discussed, covering a wide range of topics of national importance. Key discussions included the implementation of fast-track special courts to ensure swift investigation and speedy resolution of rape cases involving women and children, the establishment of brick-and-mortar banking facilities, and the rollout of an Emergency Response Support System (ERSS) in every designated village area.

Shri Shah urged all member states of the Central Zonal Council to eliminate child malnutrition, reduce the dropout ratio to zero, and strengthen inter-state cooperation.

He also called on the states to enhance the revenue of Gram Panchayats by formulating appropriate rules.

Cooperatives Promote Sahakar Taxi Service

A multi-state cooperative society named Sahakar Taxi Cooperative Limited has officially been registered to implement this initiative. The country's first cooperative-run taxi service is expected to be launched by December this year, marking a transformative moment for India's transport landscape.

The National Cooperative Development Corporation (NCDC), which plays a key role in supporting cooperative institutions nationwide, is the lead promoter of this initiative. Additionally, seven other major cooperatives, Amul, NAFED, NABARD, IFFCO, KRIBHCO, NDDB and NCEL, have come on board as co-promoters.

Sahakar Taxi Cooperative Limited is registered under the Multi-State Cooperative Societies Act, 2002, with an authorized share capital of ₹300 crore. In the initial phase, each promoter organization has pledged to contribute ₹10 crore, laying a strong financial foundation for the launch and scalability of the platform. This initiative is expected to revolutionize the transport sector



by integrating cooperative values with modern technology, offering both economic opportunity and social security to thousands of taxi drivers across the country.

Bookings to Be Made Through 'Sahakar' App

The cooperative taxi service will initially launch operations in Delhi, Uttar Pradesh, Gujarat, and Maharashtra, with plans to expand across the rest of the country in later phases. The app-based platform facilitating this service will be named 'Sahakar'. Through the app, customers will be able to book not only taxis but also two-wheelers, e-rickshaws, and cars.

The standout feature of Sahakar Taxi is its cooperative structure, where drivers are not merely service providers but co-owners of the cooperative society. This innovative model ensures fair profit-sharing, involvement in decision-making, and improved working conditions for drivers. Unlike conventional ride-hailing services driven purely by profit, Sahakar Taxi will charge a fair and transparent fare from passengers, with a significant portion of profits distributed among the drivers. The platform also emphasizes social security for its driver-members.

Interim Board For **Cooperative Taxi Service**

Discussions have already begun with potential technology partners for the development of a dedicated mobile app for the service. To ensure the technological strength of the platform, collaborations with top academic institutions like IIT Bangalore are being explored.

This partnership will help robust establish technical infrastructure, operational systems, and seamless digital integration in line with industry standards.

The initiative, titled Sahakar Taxi Cooperative Limited, aims not only to offer consumers affordable, efficient, and reliable transport services but also to create a sustainable and inclusive livelihood model for taxi drivers. It marks a significant step in transforming the transport sector through a cooperative approach rooted in technology, inclusiveness, and shared values.

Passengers using Sahakar Taxi will benefit from fair pricing - with no surcharges or tips. In the initial phase, around 400-500 drivers are expected to be onboarded. After completing six months, each driver will be eligible to become a member of the cooperative by purchasing five shares worth ₹100 each. ◆◆◆

This announcement was made by Union Home Minister and Minister of Cooperation, Shri Amit Shah during a national seminar organized by NAFED in Mumbai, marking the International Year of Cooperatives 2025. This marks the fourth major initiative in the cooperative sector this year. Earlier, the Ministry

of Cooperation had introduced several key initiatives, including the establishment of the country's first cooperative university, the launch of a cooperative taxi service, and the formation of three new multi-state cooperatives in the dairy sector. These steps are expected to play a vital role in fulfilling Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi's vision of

'Prosperity through Cooperation'.

While addressing the national seminar organized by NAFED, Shri Amit Shah said, "The government has decided to establish Tribhuvan Cooperative University, and its groundbreaking ceremony will take place soon. A taxi service based on the cooperative model will also be launched, where the taxi driver



will not just be associated with the service but will also be an owner. The profits will go directly into their bank accounts. Additionally, a fully-owned cooperative insurance company will be launched soon, increasing the share of cooperatives in the insurance sector. This will open up many new opportunities."

Currently, among the cooperative institutions in the country, only IFFCO is involved in the insurance sector, and that too as part of a joint venture, not with full ownership. According to Shri Shah's announcement, the upcoming insurance company will be entirely owned by cooperative institutions. The blueprint this company, such as which cooperatives will be involved and whether it will operate in the general insurance or life insurance sector, is yet to be finalized. However, the establishment of this new cooperative insurance company is expected to significantly strengthen cooperative expand the movement in India.

During the program, agreements were formalized with new Primary Agricultural Credit Societies (PACS) for NAFED's new product lines, along with grants to Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs) and for the construction of warehouses, highlighting NAFED's commitment to farmer-centric initiatives. Union Home and Cooperation Minister Shri Amit Shah remarked that NAFED has created numerous success stories. Farmers work hard in the fields and supply their produce to the Government of India at the Minimum Support Price (MSP), which is then distributed as 5 kg of free ration every month to the underprivileged. Both NCCF (National Cooperative Consumers' Federation) and NAFED form the backbone of this entire initiative.

Shri Shah added that if farmers register on NAFED's app, the



organization will procure 100% of their pulses and maize at MSP. Encouraged by the success of this model, NAFED is now preparing to start direct procurement from farmers in the near future. This system will empower farmers to better plan their crop production.

Union Minister further shared that the creation of three new national-level cooperative institutions, National Cooperative Exports Limited (NCEL), National Cooperative **Organics** Limited (NCOL), and Indian Seed Cooperative Society Limited (BBSSL), will open global markets for Indian farmers, ensuring that the profits go directly to them. He noted that promoting and marketing organic products under the 'Bharat Organic' label, as part of the Bharat brand, will not only benefit traditional and organic farmers but also provide consumers access to trustworthy organic products. Additionally, the government is focusing on seed conservation, improvement, and boosting productivity.

Shri Shah expressed confidence that within the next ten years, these three newly established cooperatives could grow into large institutions akin to Amul, NAFED, IFFCO, and KRIBHCO, playing a pivotal role in supporting Indian farmers.

He also noted that almost all PACS across the country have now been computerized, with around 52,000 of them going live. PACS have become viable and multifaceted entities, now authorized to carry out 24 different types of services. Through the

integration with Common Service Centres (CSCs), PACS are now serving as access points for as many as 300 different government schemes. Post-computerization, accounting systems have been made available in the local languages of each state to ensure ease of use.

On the technological front, the Ministry of Cooperation has taken significant steps to modernize and empower cooperatives. A key reform is the tax parity now being established between cooperatives and corporates under the Income Tax Act. The surcharge for cooperatives has been reduced from 12% to 7%, and the Minimum Alternate Tax (MAT) has been lowered from 18.5% to 15%. Additionally, PACS have been exempted from income tax penalties for transactions below ₹2 lakh. Long-standing tax disputes involving cooperative sugar mills have also been resolved.

To provide financial support to the cooperative sector, significant reforms have been implemented the National Cooperative Development Corporation (NCDC). So far, financial assistance amounting to approximately ₹1.38 lakh crore has been extended through NCDC. In the fisheries sector, 44 deep-sea trawlers are being provided through cooperatives to boost marine farming. Simultaneously, the dairy sector is being strengthened under the White Revolution 2.0 initiative.

Union Home and Cooperation Minister Shri Amit Shah highlighted that the Government of India has also increased the procurement price of ethanol produced from maize, ensuring fair returns for maize farmers. Today, ethanol derived from corn is being blended up to 20% in petrol, significantly helping reduce the nation's import bill. Going forward, efforts are also being made to promote a circular economy within the dairy sector. •••

This historic step, in line with Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi's vision of "Prosperity through Cooperation," placed the responsibility in the hands of Union Home Minister Shri Amit Shah, who became the country's first Cooperation Minister.

Since the formation of the Ministry, the sector has seen transformative reforms and forward-looking policies. Under the dynamic leadership of Shri

Shah, several innovative steps have been introduced, including the establishment of three national-level cooperative bodies focused on the export of organic products, the seed sector, and multipurpose services. National Cooperative University: A **Transformational Initiative**

The government has launched the National Cooperative University to advance cooperative education and professional development. This university aims to equip students and cooperative professionals with specialized training in areas such cooperative administration, leadership, entrepreneurship, digital management, and policy-making. The goal is not only to strengthen the professional capabilities within the cooperative sector but also to generate employment opportunities, particularly for rural youth. The university will help meet the growing demand for skilled professionals in cooperative banks, marketing federations, housing societies, agricultural service societies, and other cooperative institutions.

Launch of the **Learning Management System Portal**

As a major step toward the digitalization of cooperative education, the National Cooperative Union of India (NCUI) has developed the Learning Management System (LMS) Portal. This initiative aligns with Prime Minister Shri Narendra

Modi's vision of a technologically empowered India and self-reliant cooperatives. The portal delivers technical education and quality training to individuals involved in the cooperative sector, aiming to make learning accessible, engaging, and tailored to local needs.

Through this platform, youth, cooperative members, employees, and entrepreneurs can gain in-depth knowledge and practical skills in areas such as cooperative management, governance, accounting, auditing, procedures, and entrepreneurship. The LMS portal offers numerous benefits, especially for young people. Students from both rural and urban areas can access online training simultaneously through digital means. This, in turn, boosts the demand for trainers, consultants, and managers within cooperative institutions, creating fresh employment opportunities. The portal also provides training and guidance for self-employment and entrepreneurship in the cooperative
