#### Focus on Adequate Foodgrain Storage



ecognizing the critical importance of foodgrain storage for national food security, the Ministry of Cooperation is playing a key role in the construction of warehouses across the country. In line with this vision, the Ministry has initiated work on the world's largest Grain Storage Scheme. This ambitious initiative aims to prevent post-harvest losses and reduce damage caused by the lack of proper

storage facilities. The total estimated cost of the world's largest foodgrain storage scheme is ₹1 lakh crore. The scheme is expected to create an additional storage capacity of 7 crore tonnes across the country. Currently, against India's total foodgrain production of 33.02 crore tonnes, storage facilities exist for only 47% of the produce, indicating substantial scope for expanding storage infrastructure. Under the guidance of Union Minister of Cooperation Shri Amit Shah, the construction of new warehouses has already commenced. Traditional storage methods also result in significant losses of foodgrains, highlighting the urgent need for modern storage solutions. At present, India has storage capacity for 14 crore tonnes of foodgrains. With the successful implementation of the Ministry's plan, the target is to increase this capacity to 21 crore tonnes.

Preventing post-harvest losses of crops can significantly strengthen the nation's food security. Under the implementation of the National Food Security Act, free foodgrains are distributed to two-thirds of the country's population, which requires an annual supply of 6.02 crore tonnes of foodgrains. In addition, the country needs to maintain buffer stocks of foodgrains to deal with times of disaster and emergencies. This makes it imperative to have adequate warehouse facilities, and in this regard, the Grain Storage Scheme is set to play a pivotal role. The scheme will also prove instrumental in ensuring that farmers get fair value for their produce, along with proper storage and maintenance of their harvest. The Modi Government at the Centre is making consistent efforts in this direction to safeguard both farmers' interests and the nation's food security infrastructure.

For the distribution of free foodgrains to two-thirds of India's underprivileged population, the country requires over 6 crore tonnes of foodgrains annually. In addition to this, strategic reserves are essential for ensuring food security, for which buffer stocks are maintained. Ensuring the widespread distribution of foodgrains across the country has always been a logistical challenge. To address this, the cooperative sector has decided to construct small-scale warehouses through Primary Agricultural Credit Societies (PACS). These warehouses will store locally produced grains at the village level, making it easier to distribute food through the Public Distribution System. This localized storage model will streamline procurement, transportation, and distribution, significantly reducing logistics costs. As a result, it will help minimize revenue losses and enhance the efficiency of the country's foodgrain supply chain.

Following the success of the pilot phase of the Grain Storage Scheme, it is now being rolled out across the entire country. The first phase of the initiative has already been launched. At the grassroots level, Primary Cooperative Societies, the lowest tier of the cooperative structure, have begun constructing warehouses at the village panchayat level. The implementation of this storage expansion plan will not only enhance storage capacity but also generate employment opportunities in rural areas through the construction of these warehouses. Additionally, to support the storage of horticultural produce-including fruits, flowers, and vegetables-the scheme will expand the availability of cold storage facilities. This integrated effort will ensure the efficient supply of all food items across the nation. •••

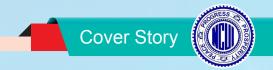

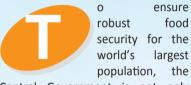

# PACS to Build Warehouses in Every Gram Panchayat

Central Government is not only focusing on increasing foodgrain production through improved productivity but also giving top priority to safe storage of the produce. To achieve this goal, the Grain Storage Scheme has been launched with an allocation of ₹1 lakh crore. Under this initiative, Primary Agricultural Credit Societies (PACS) will construct grain warehouses in rural areas. This scheme will not only boost grain storage facilities at the village level but will also generate new employment opportunities in rural regions. It will help minimize the significant post-harvest losses of agricultural produce and prevent

lack of proper storage infrastructure.

The establishment of warehouses in villages will create direct employment opportunities such as maintenance and management of these facilities. Additionally, it will lead to indirect jobs related to transportation and logistics of grains. These opportunities will primarily benefit the youth of the same village and panchayat where the warehouses are built. Moreover,

development of other basic infrastructure related to agriculture, further creating avenues for rural employment.

Under this ambitious scheme, a total grain storage capacity of 70 million tonnes will be developed over five years. The most crucial role in this initiative is played by the PACS — the grassroots units of the cooperative



PACS have been designated for multiple responsibilities: setting up Custom Hiring Centers, procuring grain directly from farmers, establishing primary processing centers after purchasing grains from mandis, and developing foodgrain storage capacities. In the first phase of implementation, a pilot project has been launched involving 24 PACS from 24 districts across 24 states. Out of these, warehouse construction and grain storage have already commenced in 11 PACS across 11 states. The construction of these warehouses has been undertaken with the support of the National Cooperative Development Corporation (NCDC), the National Bank for Agriculture and Rural Development (NABARD), and NABARD Consultancy Services (NABCONS). The 11 states where PACS have already begun operations this scheme under include Maharashtra, Uttar Pradesh, Tamil Nadu, Karnataka, Gujarat, Madhya Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Assam, Telangana, Tripura, and Rajasthan. Together, these PACS have created a total storage capacity of 9,750 tonnes.

Encouraged by the success of the pilot project, state governments and union territories have identified 575 additional PACS to participate in the expanded pilot phase. Of these, foundation stones have been laid for warehouses in 500 PACS. Detailed Project Reports (DPRs) have been submitted for 326 PACS, and financial closure has been completed for 136 PACS. To facilitate the utilization of these warehouses, Memorandums of Understanding (MoUs) have been signed between the Food Corporation of India (FCI), the National Cooperative Development Corporation (NCDC), and the Department of Food and Public Distribution.

As a result of the pilot project of the world's largest grain storage scheme, a total of 9,750 metric tonnes of decentralized storage capacity has been created at the PACS level. The objective of construction of warehouses at the PACS level is to reduce wastage of foodgrains by creating adequate decentralized storage capacity, strengthen the food security of the country, prevent distress sale of crops and enable farmers to get better prices for their crops.

2047, India's population will reach approximately 1.61 billion. To meet the growing demand, not only will foodgrain production need to be increased, but the storage infrastructure must also be significantly enhanced. This project will play a vital role in strengthening food security by enhancing storage capacity at the grassroots level. It will also empower PACS, develop farmgate infrastructure, and contribute to increasing farmers' incomes.

Ultimately, it will strengthen the rural economy, paving the way for a truly self-reliant India.

### Warehouses to Be Built in All Blocks

In the first phase of constructing rural warehouses, warehouses will be established in every block across the country. It is estimated that approximately 50,000 tonnes of storage capacity will be created in this initial phase. The scheme is adopting new flexible technologies,





including the construction of silosmodern steel structures using advanced technology—as well as conventional warehouses. These facilities will range in capacity from 50 tonnes to 750 tonnes, depending on the needs at the Gram Panchayat level.

The warehouses constructed by PACS will be leased out to agencies such as the Food Corporation of India (FCI) and other private entities for storage, thereby generating additional income for PACS. PACS will also be able to sell the grain they procure at the Minimum Support Price (MSP). Furthermore, these warehouses will be equipped with grain processing facilities, enabling value addition to the produce before sale.

The establishment of small warehouses at the village level will be highly beneficial for farmers. It will also reduce the transportation cost for government agencies that procure grains from farmers and deliver them to ration shops. Currently, grains are transported from villages to urban warehouses, and then brought back to village ration shops, effectively doubling

the logistics cost. With warehouses located in villages, this additional transportation step will eliminated, resulting in significant

According to Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi, India's grain storage capacity will reach 7 crore tonnes over the next five years. This significant expansion will help prevent wastage of foodgrains across the country. In this endeavour, the cooperative sector is expected to play an even greater role. Cooperation is not merely a system—it is a spirit and a consciousness. It has the power to transform a basic livelihood arrangement into a major industrial force. It is a proven pathway to rejuvenating the national economy, especially the agricultural and rural economy. The Grain Storage Scheme is a major step toward realizing the national vision of "Prosperity through Cooperation." Under this scheme, thousands of warehouses will be built across every corner of the country.

#### **Food Security Through Better Storage Capacity**

is the second-largest foodgrain producer in the world. According to the second advance estimates of the Union Ministry of Agriculture, foodgrain production in the crop year 2024-25 is projected to reach 33.09 crore tonnes. However, India's total storage capacity currently stands at only 14.49 crore tonnes, which is approximately 47% of its total production. In contrast, several other major food-producing nations have storage capacities exceeding their production levels, with ratios as high as 131%. Due to the limited number of warehouses and inadequate storage infrastructure, India suffers from significant foodgrain wastage. Farmers are often forced to sell their produce at non-remunerative prices due to a lack of nearby

storage facilities. For instance, China produces 61.5 crore tonnes of foodgrains and has a storage capacity of 66 crore tonnes. The United States produces 42.2 crore tonnes with a storage capacity of 68 crore tonnes. Other countries like Brazil, Russia, Argentina, Ukraine, France, and Canada also have storage capacities exceeding their production levels. In comparison, India faces a storage shortfall of nearly 18 crore tonnes against its total annual foodgrain production.

The decentralized procurement of foodgrains will help strengthen the supply chain, involving PACS, private players, and government agencies such as the Food Corporation of India (FCI). Local procurement will also enable local needs to be fulfilled directly, improving efficiency and accessibility. This will facilitate

the supply of foodgrains to nearby markets and ration shops under the Public Distribution System (PDS) at lower costs. Consequently, this will help control inflation and reduce the burden of food subsidies on the government treasury. Setting up Custom Hiring Centres (CHCs) at the PACS level will also aid in increasing productivity and minimizing postharvest losses. Under the Agriculture Infrastructure Fund and Agricultural Marketing Infrastructure Scheme, PACS are eligible for subsidies, which will enable the procurement of equipment for grain cleaning, sorting, and drying before storage. These initiatives will not only reduce losses but also generate employment opportunities in rural areas.

#### **NBCC: Nodal Agency for Warehouse Construction**

The Grain Storage Scheme is being implemented across rural India through the coordinated efforts of the National Cooperative Development Corporation (NCDC), the National Bank for Agriculture and Rural Development (NABARD), the Ministry of Cooperation, and the Ministry of Consumer Affairs. The NCDC has been entrusted with the key responsibility of implementing the scheme nationwide. States have begun showing keen interest in participating in the initiative. Prominent cooperative institutions such as the National Cooperative Consumers' Federation of India (NCCF) and the National Agricultural Cooperative Marketing Federation of India (NAFED) have also stepped forward to actively engage in the project. To ensure efficient execution, the central government designated the National **Buildings Construction Corporation** (NBCC) as the nodal construction agency. NBCC is working closely with Primary Agricultural Credit Societies (PACS)—the grassroots units of the cooperative sector—to

construct rural warehouses under the scheme. Under the supervision of the Ministry of Cooperation, NBCC has already signed over 200 Memorandums of Understanding (MoUs) for warehouse construction in collaboration with various PACS across the country.

### Cold Storage Facilities for Vegetables

National The Cooperative Consumers' Federation of India (NCCF), a key agency in the cooperative sector, is actively working to establish warehouses for pulses and cold storage facilities for vegetables in various producing states across the country. Similarly, NAFED has also decided to partner with Primary Agricultural Credit Societies (PACS) to build warehouses at its production centers and market yards. This initiative will provide assured income streams for PACS, strengthening their financial sustainability. Together, NCCF and NAFED have identified over 2,500 PACS across different states where warehouses and cold storage units can be developed. The development of dedicated storage facilities for vegetables will boost vegetable cultivation, ultimately leading to higher income for farmers. Compared to traditional crops, vegetable farming offers better returns, which is increasingly attracting young farmers. However, due to the lack of proper



storage infrastructure, vegetable producers often suffer significant financial losses. With adequate storage facilities, not only will these losses be minimized, but wastage of perishable produce will also be significantly reduced. According to the Ministry of Cooperation, states like Uttarakhand and Jharkhand have expressed interest in constructing PACS-linked these warehouses through their respective state agencies. The central government has granted them permission to proceed with this model.

The Grain Storage Scheme is set to benefit approximately 13 crore farmers associated with PACS across the country. These farmers, linked to the cooperative sector, rely on cooperative institutions for essential agricultural inputs such as fertilizers, seeds, pesticides, and other necessities. All PACS in the country receive an annual credit

disbursement of nearly ₹5 lakh crore from 352 District Central Cooperative Banks and 34 State Cooperative Banks, of which ₹1.3 lakh crore is refinanced by NABARD (National Bank for Agriculture and Rural Development).

The lack of adequate grain storage in India has long harmed both food security and farmers' incomes. Despite being a major grain-producing country, India can store less than 50% of the grain it produces. This challenge is being addressed through the world's largest grain storage initiative, which will not only enhance the capacity of Indian farmers but also generate new employment opportunities in rural areas. An investment of over ₹40,000 crore has already been made to develop rural agriculture infrastructure, with a significant share contributed by cooperative societies. •••

### All Districts to Become Storage-Capable

At present, 430 districts across 26 states and 3 union territories in India face severe shortages in foodgrain storage facilities, causing significant challenges for local farmers. These districts are home to nearly 74,000 Primary Agricultural Credit Societies. Most of these regions lack even the minimum storage capacity needed to meet the requirements of the Public Distribution System (PDS), despite being surplus producers of foodgrains.

In contrast, only 9 districts out of 134 in five states have surplus storage capacity. Among major food-producing states, Punjab stands out as the only state with adequate and well-managed storage infrastructure. In other states, Madhya Pradesh has only one district facing storage shortages out of a total of 52. Haryana reports inadequate storage in just three districts. In stark contrast, West Bengal faces a severe gap, with 22 out of its 23 districts lacking sufficient storage facilities. Similarly, Uttar Pradesh struggles with inadequate storage capacity in 64 of its 75 districts.

Meanwhile, storage infrastructure in Bihar, Karnataka, Odisha, Jharkhand, Assam, Maharashtra, Gujarat, and Rajasthan is also far from satisfactory. The true extent of the storage gap in the remaining states can be understood from the following statistical tables.

## **Depot Darpan to Enable Accurate Monitoring of Foodgrain Storage**

depots across the country, the Department of Food and Public Distribution is consistently adopting modern technologies. As part of this initiative, a digital system-Depot Darpan portal and mobile app—has been developed to enable precise monitoring of storage operations. The aim is to ensure that foodgrain depots meet the highest standards of quality and performance. The platform will allow depot managers to assess infrastructure, operations, and financial performance in real time, making the entire storage system more transparent, efficient, and accountable.

Depot Darpan has been seamlessly integrated with smart warehousing technology to create a comprehensive digital monitoring ecosystem that ensures both the security and efficiency of foodgrain storage. This advanced system incorporates real-time surveillance through CCTV and a range of IoT (Internet of Things) sensors installed across warehouses. These IoT sensors include ambient sensors to monitor temperature and moisture levels of stored grains, CO<sub>2</sub> sensors to detect potential infestations, and phosphine gas sensors that provide early warnings of toxic gas presence. Fire sensors are in place to immediately alert authorities in case of fire, helping to prevent large-scale damage.



Beyond sensor-based monitoring, Al-based technology is being piloted for accurate grain bag counting. To enhance logistics and security, ANPR (Automatic Number Plate Recognition) systems are used to identify and track vehicles transporting foodgrains, while Face Recognition Systems (FRS) have been introduced for controlled and security verification. This digital warehousing initiative currently covers 2,278 warehouses, including those owned by the Food Corporation of India (FCI), the Central Warehousing Corporation (CWC), as well as facilities rented from state agencies and private entities.

Through the Depot Darpan platform, depot managers upload geo-tagged inputs regarding the available infrastructure at their respective depots. This data will be used to generate automated ratings and action points, enabling timely corrective measures. Not only depot managers, but also supervisory officers and third-party auditors will be able to monitor depot performance and from anywhere, anytime

facilitating informed decision-making. The automated reports generated by the system will be utilized in regular performance reviews.

The warehouses included in this system will be evaluated on two key categories. The first category focuses on infrastructure-related parameters, such as safety standards, storage conditions, environmental factors, technology adoption, and statutory compliance. The second category pertains to operational efficiency, which includes stock turnover, losses, space utilization, manpower expenditure, profitability. Each category will be assessed independently, and depots will be awarded star ratings based on a combined overall score from both sets of criteria.

Depot Darpan serves as a true reflection of storage excellence, ensuring improved warehousing and enhanced operational efficiency within the Public Distribution System (PDS). With each grain scientifically stored, the platform reinforces the nation's commitment to food security. •••

Shri Narendra Modi's vision of transforming India into the world's third-largest economy. In line with this goal, efforts are being made to increase the contribution of cooperatives in the export sector as well.

Union Home and Cooperation Minister Shri Amit Shah has set an ambitious export target of ₹2 lakh crore for the National Cooperative Exports Limited (NCEL). This target was announced during a high-level review meeting on the progress of NCEL, National Cooperative Organics Limited (NCOL), and the Bharatiya

Beej Sahakari Samiti Limited (BBSSL). The directive includes exploring new international markets and strengthening India's cooperative export capacity, marking a significant towards making cooperatives globally competitive.

During the review meeting, Shri

Amit Shah instructed officials to identify three distinctive products that are currently not being exported from India. He also mandated that all exports by cooperative institutions be routed exclusively through the NCEL, so that a turnover of ₹20,000 to ₹30,000 crore can be achieved,



and the net profits—after taxes and operational costs—can be returned to the cooperative societies. In the meeting, he emphasized that NCEL should actively explore new export opportunities for sugar from cooperative sugar mills, aromatic rice from Tripura, organic cotton, and coarse grains. Additionally, he suggested exploring partnerships with large companies for exporting fresh vegetables to Gulf countries and special varieties of potatoes.

The Union Cooperation Minister also proposed that NCEL set up offices in Africa and Myanmar to facilitate the import of pulses and develop a dedicated website. This would help cooperative members understand global demand trends and share their supply capabilities accordingly.

NCEL was established under the Multi-State Cooperative Societies Act and has made remarkable progress in its very first year. In the financial year 2024-25, NCEL registered over 10,000 cooperative institutions as members and recorded a turnover of ₹4,283 crore, generating a net profit of ₹122 crore. This national-level cooperative entity has expanded its exports to 28 countries. Key products exported by NCEL include basmati and non-basmati rice, marine products (especially shrimp), coarse grains, wheat, fruits and vegetables, animal products, spices, and plantation produce. NCEL has also signed strategic Memorandums of Understanding (MoUs) with 61 importers in countries such as Senegal, Indonesia, and Nepal.

In 2023, under the leadership of Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi, the Union Cabinet approved the formation of three new national-level cooperative institutions by the Ministry of Cooperation. These apex organizations have been established with the objective of promoting cooperative exports, organic production, and high-quality seeds. Shri Amit Shah stated that these institutions are being operated under a Whole-of-Government approach, with active collaboration from relevant ministries, departments, and agencies. He emphasized that to realize the Prime Minister's vision of "Sahakar Se Samriddhi" (Prosperity through Cooperation), the Ministry of Cooperation has launched several initiatives and landmark schemes, which are accelerating the growth and development of the cooperative sector across the country.

#### BBSSL to Focus on Developing **High-Yielding Seeds**

Highlighting the crucial role of the BBSSL in strengthening India's seed ecosystem, Shri Amit Shah emphasized the urgent need to establish tissue culture facilities to ensure the availability of high-genetic-potential plants for the top 10 banana-producing states. He noted that the newly established state-of-the-art Seed Research Centre in Kalol, Gujarat, will focus on developing high-yielding, earlymaturing, and low water-requirement varieties of crops such as pigeon pea (arhar), black gram (urad), and maize. Shah also stressed the importance of developing sugarcane varieties with high sucrose content and low water needs. Additionally, BBSSL has been directed to develop seeds for resilient fodder crops to be marketed through the networks of NDDB and Amul. He also underlined the need to promote seed production programs for processing varieties, especially for crops like potatoes used in making French fries. To ensure timely availability of breeder seeds, the Union Cooperation Minister instructed the Ministry of Cooperation to coordinate with the Ministry of Agriculture to secure timely supplies of essential breeder seeds.

#### Target Set for NCOF: Expanding Organic Footprint under 'Bharat Organics' Brand

In the review meeting, Shri Amit Shah addressed the progress of the National Cooperative Organics Limited (NCOF), stating that organic products procured by NCOF are already being supplied to major brands like Amul and BigBasket. This has enabled significant volume and cost advantages for the 'Bharat Organics' brand. He also announced that these products will soon be available in Reliance stores across India. Currently, 22 products under the Bharat Organics brand-including grains, pulses, spices, and sweeteners—are available in the Delhi-NCR region, with plans underway to launch them in other major metropolitan cities. For the financial year 2025-26, the Union Cooperation Minister has set a turnover target of over ₹300 crore for NCOF. He also directed the formation of certified organic farmer groups at the state level and their integration at higher platforms. Since its inception, NCOF has enrolled over 7,000 cooperative institutions and has handled more than 1,200 tonnes of organic produce sourced from over 2,000 farmers. The organization has achieved a business turnover of ₹10.26 crore so far. ◆◆◆

ndia's greatest aspiration is to become a developed nation by 2047. As Prime Minister Narendra Modi recently emphasized at a public event in New Delhi, India is building its future

through rapid development driven by progressive thinking, unwavering determination, and deep compassion — always putting national interest first. He reaffirmed that self-reliance has always been a fundamental part of India's economic DNA. India is now emerging as a major defense manufacturer and exporter, supplying defense products to over 100 countries. The Prime Minister also highlighted the strength of India's indigenous naval fleet, including INS Vikrant, INS Surat, and INS Nilgiri, all built entirely with domestic capabilities — a powerful symbol of India's journey from dependence to defense leadership.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi reaffirmed that India's biggest national aspiration is to transform into a developed country by the year 2047. Speaking with conviction and clarity, he invoked the strength, resources, and unwavering resolve of the nation, while sharing the timeless thoughts of Swami Vivekananda. Quoting Swami Ji's call to "Arise, awake,

and stop not till the goal is reached," the Prime Minister said that this unyielding spirit is now evident in every citizen. He acknowledged the pivotal role of such summits in India's pursuit of development and highlighted the recent Free Trade Agreement (FTA) with the United Kingdom, calling it a historic milestone between two major open-market economies. The agreement opens a new chapter in trade and economic cooperation and is expected to accelerate growth for both nations. For Indian youth, he added, this is a significant opportunity, as it will unlock new avenues for businesses and MSMEs. He also noted that India has recently signed similar trade agreements with the UAE, Australia, and Mauritius.

Addressing the importance of sustainable water management, Shri Modi emphasized the government's major initiative to interlink rivers, citing key projects like the Ken-Betwa Link Project and the Parvati-Kalisindh-Chambal Link Project. These initiatives aim to enhance water availability and benefit millions of farmers. Referring to discussions in the media on water resources, he recalled the past when a significant share of India's water flowed beyond its borders. He resolutely declared: "India's water will now stay within the country and serve its rightful purpose – the development



of the nation."

Prime Minister Narendra Modi voiced concern over delays in major policy decisions in the past, attributing them to global opinion, electoral calculations, and political survival. He emphasized that true progress is only possible when 'Nation First' is the sole guiding principle for decisionmaking—a principle India has consistently followed over the past decade.

Citing sweeping reforms in the banking sector, the Prime Minister said, "Over the last 10-11 years, our government has taken decisive steps to resolve long-pending issues. Prior to 2014, Indian banks were on the brink of collapse. Today, India's banking sector is among the strongest in the world, and banks are posting record profits. These reforms have directly benefited depositors." Referring to Air India, he recalled its deteriorating financial condition that had resulted in massive losses of thousands of crores. "Previous governments hesitated to act. We took the necessary decisions to prevent further loss. For our government, national interest is paramount," he declared.

The Prime Minister also highlighted the revolution brought about by Direct Benefit Transfer (DBT). Earlier, only 15% of government funds meant for the poor actually reached them. Our government has plugged all leakages through DBT, ensuring that every rupee reaches its rightful beneficiary. He revealed that over 10 crore fake beneficiaries existed in government records, a result of flawed systems built by earlier administrations. Government removed these false entries from official databases, saving ₹3.5 lakh crore in potential misuse. This is the impact of genuine reform rooted in integrity and national interest, the Prime Minister asserted.

He proved wrong those who doubted whether democracy and development could coexist before 2014, showing that India is living proof of the power of democracy — capable of achieving anything. Over the past decade, 25 crore people have been lifted out of poverty. Under the MUDRA Yojana, millions of small entrepreneurs who received loans have directly experienced the positive impact of democratic governance.

He said, "Our government has moved beyond a GDPcentric approach to a GEP-centric model of progress focusing on the Gross Empowerment of People and the collective upliftment of society." When a poor family receives a permanent home, it leads to both empowerment and a boost in self-respect. When sanitation facilities are built, people are freed from the indignity of open defecation. And for beneficiaries of Ayushman Bharat, access to free healthcare coverage up to ₹5 lakh relieves them of one of their biggest financial burdens. This transformation, the Prime Minister emphasized, reflects real, people-centric progress rooted in democratic values.

Under the core philosophy of the government — "Citizen is God" (Nagrik Devo Bhava) — the administration has moved away from the old 'Mai-Baap' mindset and now places citizens at the heart of governance. He recalled the challenges once faced by senior citizens, who had to visit offices or banks annually just to prove they were alive. Today, senior citizens can submit their life certificates remotely.

India has become a significant exporter of electronic products, with services such as electricity connections, water taps, bill payments, gas cylinder bookings, and doorstep deliveries becoming increasingly streamlined. Last year, India's total exports reached a record \$825 billion — nearly double in a decade. To further accelerate this momentum, he announced the launch of Mission Manufacturing in the latest budget, aimed at taking India's production capabilities to new heights. •••

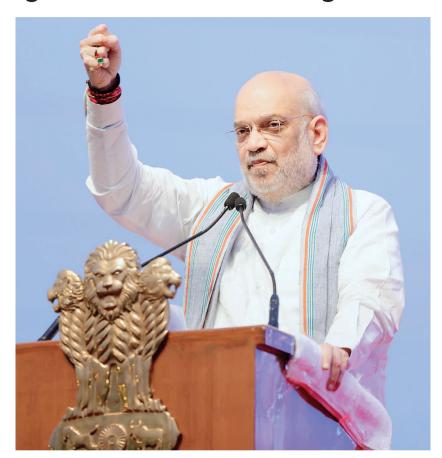

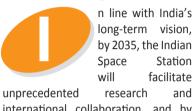

the citizens. Over the past decade, several comprehensive health programs have been implemented, creating a protective framework for the health of India's 140 crore people. Shri Shah urged all citizens to adopt a balanced diet, stay hydrated, get adequate sleep, and exercise regularly, assuring them that the government will continue to support

#### **Numerous Health Protection Schemes Launched**

Shah highlighted importance of regular health checkups, recommending that people get their vitamin E levels tested. He noted that our ancient Vedic texts emphasize that "food is medicine," a principle now being embraced globally.

#### PHCs and CHCs to Boost **Health of Citizens**

Shri Shah stated that the government is working tirelessly to enhance the country's health infrastructure. With an investment of ₹65,000 crore, efforts are underway to upgrade every Primary Health Center (PHC) and Community

Health Center (CHC) into fully functional units. More than 15,000 Jan Aushadhi Kendras have been established to provide generic medicines at 80% lower prices. Under Mission Indradhanush, free vaccinations have been administered to children from birth to age 15, and 1.32 crore mothers have also received vaccinations. Through the e-Sanjeevani telemedicine platform, over 30.9 crore digital health consultations have been provided in rural areas.

He urged the media to promote awareness alongside entertainment, and recommended that ILBS collaborate with AIIMS and other major government hospitals to offer guidance and support for liver patients, along with spreading greater awareness. ◆◆◆

Panchayats, with technology playing a crucial role in strengthening them. Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi highlighted these developments during his visit to Madhubani, Bihar, on the occasion of Panchayati Raj Day. While inaugurating, laying the foundation stone and dedicating development several projects worth over ₹13,480 crore, he stated that these initiatives span sectors such as electricity, railways and infrastructure. He added that they will generate numerous employment opportunities in Bihar. The Prime Minister shared that, in the last 10 years, over two lakh Gram Panchayats have been connected to the internet, and more than 5.5 lakh Common Service Centers have been established in villages. The digitization of Panchayats has provided significant benefits, such as simplified access to essential documents like birth and death certificates and land ownership records. He also noted that 30,000 new Panchayat Bhawans have been built across the country. Ensuring adequate funding for Panchayats has remained a top government priority, he said, revealing that over ₹2 lakh crore has been allocated to Panchayats in the past decade,

which has been used for rural development.

The Prime Minister further addressed one of the major challenges faced by Gram Panchayats - land disputes. To address this issue, the government has focused on digitizing land records, which has helped in effectively resolving unnecessary conflicts. He emphasized that Panchayats have enhanced social participation and pointed out that Bihar was the first state in India to introduce 50 percent reservation for women in Panchayats. As a result, a large number of women from economically weaker sections, Dalits, Mahadalits, backward and extremely backward communities now serve as

public representatives in the state. A law has also been enacted to provide 33 percent reservation for women in both the Lok Sabha and the State Legislative Assemblies, which will benefit women across all states and ensure greater representation for them.

The Modi government is operating in mission mode to boost women's income and generate new employment and self-employment opportunities. In Bihar, the 'Jeevika initiative has significantly transformed the lives of numerous women. Around ₹1.000 crore in financial support has been extended to women's self-help groups in the state. This initiative will further enhance women's economic empowerment and support the nationwide goal of creating 3 crore 'Lakhpati Didi'.

#### **Permanent Homes for 3 Crore More Needy Families**

Over the past decade, the rural economy has witnessed renewed momentum. Essential infrastructure such as houses, roads, gas and water connections, and toilets have been built for the poor in villages, channelling lakhs of crores of rupees into rural areas. According to the Prime Minister, these developments have generated new employment opportunities, providing income sources for labourers, farmers, drivers, and shopkeepers.

Highlighting the Aawas Yojana, Prime Minister Shri Modi stated that the goal of the scheme is to ensure that no family in India remains homeless and that every household has a solid roof overhead. Over the past decade, more than 4 crore permanent houses have been constructed under the scheme. In Bihar alone, 57 lakh poor families have been provided with concrete homes.

He recounted how a tribal child from a remote area united the entire tribal community, teaching them to advocate for their rights peacefully. Shri Shah acknowledged that while Bodofa is no longer with us, his philosophy of "live and let live" continues to resonate throughout Bodoland and among tribal societies. He affirmed that Assam embraces the people of Bodoland, and Bodoland, in turn, embraces Assam, reinforcing the notion that the Bodo community has as much right to the nation as any other.

Discussing the progress of the Bodo Agreement, Shri Shah stated that after extensive discussions, the agreement



was signed in 2020, leading to the laying down of arms by all parties involved and their reintegration into the mainstream. He reported that 96 percent of the issues outlined in the agreement have been resolved, with plans to address the remaining matters promptly. He emphasized that the Modi government has been instrumental in facilitating over 20 agreements in the Northeast, bringing more than 10,000 individuals into the mainstream by laying down their arms.

Shri Shah encouraged the youth of Bodoland to embody the principle of "live and let live" and to contribute to the development of Assam. He noted that Assam has become a hub for industrial investment, attracting numerous industries

to the region. He celebrated the rich cultural diversity of the Northeast, highlighting its over 220 ethnic groups, more than 160 tribes, and a multitude of languages, dialects, festivals, and traditional practices.

Concluding his address, Shri Shah commended the Modi government for its efforts in promoting the development of Assam and the Northeast. He pointed out that Prime Minister Modi has visited the Northeast over 50 times, underscoring the administration's commitment to the region's progress. He reiterated that the culture and strength of the Northeast are invaluable assets to Indian culture, and the government dedicated to harnessing these strengths for the nation's development. \*\*\*

# **Technology Boosts Transparency** in Cooperative Societies

o strengthen and bring transparency to the cooperative sector, the

government is actively promoting the use of technology. As part of this initiative, in addition to the computerization of Primary Agricultural Credit Societies (PACS), there is a strong focus on the digitization of cooperative banks and other institutions. A national database of all cooperative institutions across the country has also been created.

Union Minister of State for Cooperation, Shri Murlidhar Mohol, stated that integrating technology into every cooperative institution will significantly increase transparency and help curb corruption. He acknowledged that the cooperative sector has historically struggled with issues of corruption, particularly in cooperative banks, which has eroded public trust. To restore this confidence, the Ministry of Cooperation has launched several reform initiatives.

In an exclusive interview with Sahakar Jagran, Shri Mohol said, "At its core, cooperation is based on the trust of the people. The more trust you earn, the stronger the cooperative sector becomes. To gain this trust, societies must be well-managed. Skilled manpower, which will emerge from the upcoming Cooperative University, will bring about significant improvements. Currently, many societies suffer from inefficiency, mismanagement,

and minimal use of technology — all of which contribute to a lack of transparency."

He further explained that computerizing all PACS is a major step in resolving these issues. "Technology will make the operations transparent and eliminate avenues for corruption, as future operations will necessarily be tech-driven. This will set the cooperative sector on the right path," he added.

Speaking on the topic of cooperative banks, Shri Mohol pointed out that they were earlier regulated by state governments, but now the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) has been entrusted with their oversight. The RBI is strictly enforcing regulations and taking action against errant banks.

He also highlighted that while State Cooperative Banks and District Cooperative Banks receive assistance through NABARD, there was no such support system for Urban Cooperative Banks. To address this gap, Union Home and Cooperation Minister Shri Amit Shah established the National Urban Cooperative Finance Development Corporation (NUCFDC), an umbrella organization that will function as a regulatory and support body for urban cooperative banks.

NUCFDC will provide financial, technical, and infrastructural support, as well as closely monitor these banks. This is expected to significantly strengthen the urban cooperative banking sector. The Ministry of Cooperation has also launched several other initiatives aimed at enhancing the capacity of cooperative banks, enabling them to offer services on par with regular commercial banks.

These comprehensive reforms and support systems are designed to restore public trust in the cooperative sector and ensure its sustained growth and efficiency.

Primary cooperative societies are becoming increasingly active, contributing to rising incomes and the creation of employment opportunities. The cooperative movement in India has long played a crucial role in driving socio-economic transformations across sectors of the economy. As a result, the country has emerged as a global force in key industries such as sugar, dairy, credit, and fertilizers. Several cooperative brands have gained recognition not only within India but also internationally. The Ministry of Cooperation has adopted Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi's vision of "Prosperity through Cooperation" as its guiding mantra.

As part of this initiative, the government has begun implementing plans to build warehouses at the Gram Panchayat level. In the past, cooperative warehouses served as lending centers where poor farmers received grain as credit during the sowing season. Now, these newly constructed warehouses will be used to store farmers' surplus grain. Instead of borrowing grain, farmers will receive cash loans for their agricultural needs. Numerous successful examples of cooperative initiatives are being established across the country. To shield farmers from exploitative middlemen and moneylenders, affordable loans are being made available at concessional interest rates.

India has a rich and long-standing history of cooperation. Even before independence, cooperative practices were prevalent in many parts of the country. The spirit of cooperation was not just a theoretical concept but a part of daily life. Rural communities collectively built and maintained assets such as reservoirs and forests, highlighting the inherent cooperative spirit.

The foundational idea of forming community groups in rural areas was to build a new, voluntary sense of collective responsibility. The rationale was that group guarantees reduced the perceived risk for lenders, making it more likely for them to provide credit to groups rather than individuals. Following a long journey of cooperative development, the Cooperative Credit Societies Act was introduced in India, initially focusing

solely on credit-related cooperatives. By 1911, there were 5,300 registered cooperative societies in India with over 300,000 members.

Post-independence, the cooperative movement gained significant momentum. The Planning Commission assigned a vital role to cooperative societies various development schemes. The aim was to adopt cooperative methods in every facet of community development. This included urban cooperative banks, workers' cooperatives, consumer cooperatives, housing societies, and training and education initiatives aimed at disseminating cooperative knowledge. Each government department was encouraged to adopt policies supportive of cooperative structures.

Given that cooperatives fall under the jurisdiction of state governments, each with its own cooperative laws, a Model Cooperative Societies Act was circulated to all states for consideration and possible implementation. Cooperatives play a pivotal role in fostering collectivism and preserving the nation's social capital.

In cooperation essence, the most effective medium for sustaining the spirit of collective action and democratic values. A widespread cooperative network acts as a powerful social institution, contributing to the creation and productive utilization of capital. Indeed, the greater the social capital, the higher the potential for national development. •••
